Lake Okeechobee Operational Change Statement

Human health concerns demand our government reform South Florida's current water policy. Discharges containing toxic algae from Lake Okeechobee to the St. Lucie and Caloosahatchee Estuaries are no longer acceptable. The frequency and severity of these toxic discharges rise as the level of Lake Okeechobee rises. Because of the health risks associated with these discharges, Lake Okeechobee must be lowered prior to the start of the rainy season. There are other significant benefits of lowering the lake: Sending maximum dry season flows south (when treatment areas have capacity) relieves hypersalinity in Everglades National Park, recharges South Florida's drinking supply, and helps mitigate the impact of sea level rise. Sending maximum dry season flows west relieves hypersalinity in the Caloosahatchee Estuary.

The Rivers Coalition, and the more than 350,000 individuals who make up their 105 member organizations, resolve to fight against keeping Lake Okeechobee levels artificially high for water storage and will push the Army Corps to maximize dry season flows from Lake Okeechobee to benefit the environment, thereby improving the environment in the dry season across South Florida and reducing the likelihood of breach of the Herbert Hoover Dike and toxic algae discharges to the St. Lucie and Caloosahatchee Rivers in the wet season.

Operational rules that determine when and where water goes throughout the whole South Florida Water Management District, including the current review of Lake Okeechobee System Operating Manual (LOSOM), need to manage the system as a system.

The fastest, simplest and cheapest way to ensure toxic discharges are minimized is to lower lake levels by sending maximum, clean, beneficial freshwater flows south to the Everglades National Park and west to Caloosahatchee river during the dry season, with a goal of bringing Lake Okeechobee to a level below 11-feet by June 1st, the start of the wet season, which is in the current Operation Band for the Lake.
